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On April 25, 2023, members of the State E-rate Coordinators' Alliance<sup>1</sup> met on Zoom with the following representatives of the Wireline Competition Bureau:

The following matters were discussed:

#### • Timing of ECF Post Commitment Request Decisions

 Members expressed concerns at the delays applicants are experiencing with the approval of post commitment requests such as SPIN changes, service substitutions, and invoice mode changes. Delays in these decisions are causing hardship for applicants and service providers to timely order and receive equipment and services. Further, in most cases, post commitment requests must be processed before an invoice on the FRN may be submitted so without timely decision letters on post commitment requests, invoices cannot be submitted.

## • Competitive Bidding Portal NPRM

- Consistent with our previously filed comments SECA remains opposed to the bidding portal.
- Additional bid requirements such as addressing SPAM bids and bids submitted after the 470 deadline continue to increase the complexity of the bidding process.
- It will be difficult if not impossible to accommodate the unique and different bidding requirements already in effect at the state and local level across the country.
- Applicants will need at least 24 months of lead time if the E-rate national bidding portal is finalized.
- SECA is continuing to work on an analysis of the difference between state procurement laws and the NPRM to identify those areas where there is a conflict between the two different procurement systems, and will submit our analysis in the coming months.
- Uploading certain documents in a repository may be a feasible, less burdensome solution to address concerns raised in the NPRM, provided that USAC does not then second guess the bidding process.

## • Streamlining E-rate – Ancillary Use Does Not Require Cost Allocation

- The cost allocation regulation has an exception for ancillary use. When there are no separately quantifiable costs and the chosen service or equipment is the most cost effective option even with the ancillary ineligible use, cost allocation is not required.
- Applicants are not given the opportunity to claim ancillary use when they receive PIA questions about ineligible uses/features/recipients of service.
  - For example, adults have started to take classes during the week at vocational-technical schools. Technically the adult learners would be considered ineligible and there would have to be a cost reduction associated with their use of E-rate services.
  - Because of a national teaching shortage some school districts are
    offering childcare in school buildings for the children of teachers. A
    school district offers daycare for the young children of students to
    enable the students to complete their education. Technically these
    young children are ineligible and there would be a cost reduction
    associated with their use of E-rate services, which raises the question
    of how much internet is used by young children under the age of 3?
    - In both examples the school is not buying additional services to accommodate the ineligible uses of services. The use of the services is incidental or ancillary and a cost reduction should not be demanded.
- SECA would like USAC to provide the ancillary use option during PIA reviews, BCAP audits and PQA assessments as an alternative to the strict cost allocation requirement that is currently mandated without consideration of the ancillary use exception.

### • Streamlining E-rate – Five-Year Discount Validations

- E-rate discount percentages do not vary widely from year to year.
- The amount of time spent annually on discount validations, by both applicants and USAC, is significant.
- Typically changes to discounts result in increases and not decreases.
- Similar to the Category 2 budget program that established a five-year enrollment number for students we believe that five-year discount validations would be a great simplification measure.
  - Applicants could have the chance of updating their enrollments and NSLP numbers during the course of the five year cycle but would not be required to do so.
  - The five-year discount validation cycle could run on the same fiveyear cycle used for Category 2 budgets.
